
Installation Service for Emily Stockert January 19, 3:00 PM, Tomales Presbyterian Church



From the Pastor's Desk



Navigating the Past, Present and Future

As we say goodbye to an old year and stand on the

cusp of a new one it creates a natural opportunity to reflect on the passage of time. Though our faith is rooted in eternal truths, it is not impervious to time. Christian faith is rooted in the past, demands full attention to the present, and provides hope for the future.

For me the past year has been a joyful surprise. Not only have I formed new relationships with a lot of people, I've been privileged to walk through the Christian year with you—highlighted by Lent-Easter and Advent-Christmas seasons.

I am also learning to live more amicably with the present--a present that we can lose if we stay stuck in the past or anxious about the future.

The future is where we are headed. It is important to plan for the future so that when we get there we are not surprised by its arrival -- unaware of its likely demands. What are some things we should hope for in 2025? We certainly hope for a new pastor. My hope is that you don't just "get someone" but "get the right someone."
