From the Pastor's Desk



Three Hard Sayings

In February, I will preach from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount where he touches upon three tender topics.

Anger—6th commandment (Thou shalt not kill)

Lust—7th commandment prohibiting adultery

Divorce—which can also become a violation of the 7th commandment

Sometimes I wish Jesus had not been so direct! His sermons were not destined to be become best sellers with the publishers of prosperity gospel. Why did Jesus say all this hard stuff—especially when he knew that 20 centuries later some American pastors who would preach in his name, would assiduously avoid everything that has to do with the high cost of discipleship? Several reasons come to mind:

First, when Jesus puts the bar high with things like dying to self, picking up the cross and following him—he is not asking us to do anything we cannot do. By doing so, he honors our agency or what some call free will.

Second, in the hard sayings Jesus is not asking us to do anything he has not already done. He is teaching by example.

Third, Jesus also takes on the legalists by pointing out that often, those who build complex legal structures are proud of keeping their rules, but lousy at practicing what they preach at the level of the heart.

Finally, Jesus wants to create a community who not only live by grace but live worthily of grace. To do the latter, we have to remember that in this amazing Sermon on the Mount, Jesus asserts that he has not come to overthrow the law—but rather to fulfill it (Matt. 5: 17-20). Law without grace is punitive, but grace without any connection to law (and prophets) disrupts community by allowing the meanest members to rule the roost.
